Annual Report of the Joint Policing Committees on the performance of their functions during 2017

Section 36 of the Garda Síochána Act 2005 provided for the establishment in 2006 of Joint Policing Committees (JPCs) in each Local Authority. In Dublin City, owing to its scale and size, this consisted of both a Citywide Joint Policing Committee and 5 Area Subcommittees corresponding with the five operational areas of the City Council.

Guidelines for the operation of Joint Policing Committees were originally introduced by the Department of Justice in 2008 and revised in August 2014 to cover the period 2014 – 2019 (Council Report no. 288/2014 refers).

With effect from April 2016 responsibility for issuing guidelines in respect of Joint Policing Committees comes under the remit of the Policing Authority, which was established by the Minister for Justice and Equality in January 2016 to oversee the performance of An Garda Síochána in relation to policing services in Ireland. The authority consists of a Chairperson and 8 ordinary members. The Authority has not made any amendments to the existing guidelines to date, although their representatives have attended a number of meetings during 2017.

The main purpose of these committees is to provide a forum whereby a Local Authority and Senior Garda personnel, with participation from Local Authority members, Oireachtas members and community/business interests, can discuss and make recommendations on matters affecting the policing of the area.

The Dublin City Joint Policing Committee, at its meeting held on 24th February 2015, approved the following process in the development of a six-year Strategic Plan and Annual Action Plans for Dublin City:

Three high priority issues for Dublin City six-year (2015-2021) Strategic Plan:

1. Community Safety / Confidence-building
2. Antisocial Behaviour – Housing Estates
3. Street Crime

The following action matters will form the basis of annual work plans for each of the six committees:

Representatives from the Ana Liffey Drug Project (ALDP) attend on a regular basis to update group on their ongoing work to tackle this issue.</p> <p><u>Assertive Case Management Team (ACMT)</u> Following on from the production of the Evaluation Report in November 2016, and supported by the HLG of senior stakeholders, 59 people signed up for interagency case management with the Dublin City ACMT during 2017. The team has a clear focus on a small identifiable number of the most entrenched</p>

and vulnerable people living with addiction and homelessness in Dublin city centre. It has a clear, pragmatic ethos and purpose, successfully combining a focus on individual health with wider economic and social well-being for the city.

During 2017 the team responded to many requests from various city centre stakeholders for support to approach people engaged in anti-social behaviour. In addition the team engaged people whilst on street outreach and provided brief interventions, information, advice and signposting to services.

Medically Supervised Injecting Facility (MSIF)

Dr. Eamon Keenan (Clinical Lead, Addiction Services) and Mr. Joe Doyle, HSE, attended the July 2017 meeting of the Dublin City Centre Business Forum to provide an overview of the proposal to members. Minister Catherine Byrne also addressed members of the Dublin City JPC at the September 2017 meeting to address members' queries.

Subsequently the Health Service Executive (HSE) announced in February 2018 that Merchants Quay Project has been selected to operate the Supervised Injecting Facility on a pilot basis for a period

					<p>of 18 months. This is subject to planning approval and, if successful, the service will operate from the existing premises on Middle Abbey Street. A commitment has been given to engage in a consultation process with affected stakeholders in due course.</p> <p><u>“Think before you buy” campaign</u> A presentation on this campaign, the objective being to highlight awareness of the link between casual recreational drug use, the real money and the resulting devastating serious violence, was made to the March 2017 JPC by SAFER Blanchardstown. Begging:

Begging Report, carried out by Ms. Alice O'Flynn, Independent Researcher was circulated at meetings of the *Dublin City JPC*, *High Level Group on Street Issues* and *Dublin City Centre Business Forum* in early 2017. Ms. O'Flynn attended meetings of all 3 groups to address queries raised in respect of the study. Recommendations are in the process of being actioned.

Public Order Patrols

Originally introduced by An Garda Síochána in 2016 in a bid to enhance security to the areas of the city centre with high footfall (e.g. Temple Bar, Harcourt St., Camden St. environs of nightclubs), these continue to operate, now on a nightly basis (previously Thursday to Saturday only). Groups of 4 gardaí patrol areas on foot. Feedback has been extremely positive to date and these will continue to operate for the foreseeable future, resources-permitting.

Street Drinking

Topic discussed on an ongoing basis with members of AGS & Business/Community Reps at JPC,

High Level Group and Dublin City Centre Business Forum meetings. Similar security arrangements to the Easter 2016 Commemorations were put in place for both St. Patrick's Day and Easter celebrations 2017, which significantly reduced incidences of antisocial behaviour associated with alcohol consumption. This has been attributed to strong co-operation between DCC, AGS and Business representative groups.

Estate Management

Update provided to July 2017 JPC meeting by Housing & Community Services official on implications of the Housing Act 2014 in terms of estate management, dealing with antisocial behaviour, securing evictions in The Courts etc.

Parks Subcommittee

Les Moore, City Parks Superintendent, addressed member of the JPC in July 2017 to raise awareness of the issues affecting Parks Division staff on a daily basis in terms of various forms of antisocial behaviour. It was subsequently agreed that a Parks Subcommittee be established, with membership comprising the Assistant Chief Executive (DCC), Assistant Garda Commissioner, Chairperson of Dublin City JPC and both City Parks Superintendent & Senior

					Executive Parks Superintendent. One meeting of the group has been held to date with separate meetings taking place in the interim between officials from the Mapping Divisions of both DCC and AGS.

Initiatives

Community CCTV

This new grand aid scheme for community-based CCTV systems was announced by the Tánaiste & Minister for Justice and Equality in April 2017. Under the scheme, eligible community groups may apply for grant-aid of up to 60% of the total capital cost of a proposed CCTV system, up to a maximum grant of €40,000. A total of €1 million is available nationally; scheme will run for 3 years with funding of €1 million available each year. All payments will be made via the Applicants’ Local Authority. It is responsibility of the applicant to put in place appropriate payment arrangements with their Local Authority therefore supplier set up forms etc. may need to be set up, tax clearance etc.
