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# Message from the Chairperson of the County Galway Joint Policing Committee

As Chairperson of the County Galway Joint Policing Committee, I welcome the publication of the 2018 Annual Report. The work of the three sub-committees during 2018, continued to afford the JPC the opportunity to progress strategic objectives of the 6 Year JPC Strategic Plan. I wish to acknowledge the work of the Chairs and members of the Sub-Committees for their work during 2018.

I wish to record my appreciation to the An Garda Síochána team led by Chief Superintendent Tomás Curley and the Galway County Council team led by Mr. Alan Farrell, A//Director of Service on behalf of the Chief Executive (interim) Mr. Kevin Kelly, for their very valued contributions to the work of the Committee.

I would like to acknowledge the excellent level of participation by the elected and community representatives on the Committee and to each member of the JPC for their continuing support in fulfilling the role and purpose of the JPC and to Galway County Council for the administration of the Committee.

### **INTRODUCTION**

Section 35 of Garda Síochána Act, 2005 provides for the establishment of Joint Policing Committees (JPC). The County Galway Joint Policing Committee was established in 2009.

The County Galway JPC committee comprises 34 members representing Galway County Council (elected members and officials), members of the Oireachtas in the county, An Garda Síochána and the Community and Voluntary sector.

The JPC's function is to serve as a forum for consultations, discussions and recommendations on matters affecting the policing of Galway County Council's administrative area, and to keep under review:

- the levels and patterns of crime, disorder and anti-social behavior in that area, and
- the factors underlying and contributing to the levels of crime, disorder and antisocial behavior in the area

County Galway JPC has a Strategic Plan for the period 2015-2021 which contains four high-priority objectives contributing to the improved safety and quality of life in the community.

This Annual Report 2018 outlines how the County Galway Joint Policing Committee carried out its function for this period in compliance with section 36(2) of the Garda Síochána Act 2005 and in accordance with the revised Joint Policing Committee guidelines of 2014.

### 2. Road Safety

The Committee, NUI Galway Student's Union and An Garda Síochána co-ordinated a high visibility event to mark 'National Be Safe Be Seen Day', on the shortest and darkest day of the year, 21st December 2018. This 'Be Safe, Be Seen Day' event aimed to remind people of the importance of wearing high visibility material when out walking, cycling or motorcycling and encourages the students and the public to do so throughout the year, but especially on the shortest day of the year and during the winter months. # 3. Illegal Substance Abuse and Underage Drinking

### **ITEM 2: KEY ACHIEVEMENTS 2018**

### Achievement 1/2018

### 'Glan agus Glas' Supermacs Initiative

During 2018, the *Illegal Dumping & Littering Sub-Committee* led on an initiative 'Glan agus Glas' (Clean and Green) which was a collaborative approach to anti-litter by Galway County Council working together with Supermacs Fast Food restaurant.

The initiative launched earlier this year by Supermacs saw the creation of Green Teams in each Supermacs fast food outlets who work to reduce littering outside Supermacs outlets. Other changes as part of the initial phase of this 'Glan agus Glas' (Clean and Green) initiative was the use of 100% recyclable cups; paper straws to replace plastic straws; biodegradable burger wrapping and the introduction of dispensers for sachets and napkins.

To support Galway County Council's ongoing "A Cleaner, Greener, Galway" campaign a radio and newspaper campaign was launched in conjunction with the Environmental Enforcement Team of Galway County Council with a message stating that if one dumps illegally one will be prosecuted.

The aim of this collective and shared campaign is to generate maximum awareness amongst the people of Galway with a view to ultimately eliminating litter and illegal dumping from Galway's environment and eradicating the need for clean ups. Thus creating "a cleaner, greener, Galway" for everyone to enjoy.

This action was significant as Galway being in 2018 - Galway, European Region of Gastronomy - and the movement closer to its designation as Galway 2020 European Capital

of Culture, it is the aim of Galway County Council to show the ultimate in local authority leadership by having "a cleaner, greener Galway" for Galwegians and visitors alike.

### Achievement 2/2018

In accordance with the strategy to promote and advise the public of the importance of road safety, the **Education & Awareness Sub Committee** in conjunction with An Garda Siochána and the Road Safety Officer, in line with the Road Safety Plan 2017-2020, assisted in highlighting road safety awareness to all the importance of being visible at all times through its many programmes held throughout the year to include the 'National Be Safe Be Seen Day' campaign.



This high visibility event held in conjunction with NUI Galway Student's Union to mark 'National Be Safe Be Seen Day', on the shortest and darkest day of the year, 21st December 2018 aimed to remind people of the importance of wearing high visibility material when out walking, cycling or motorcycling and encourages the public to do so throughout the year, but especially on the shortest day of the year and during the winter months. To mark the day, high visibility vests were distributed to students attending the college, courtesy of the Road Safety Authority and this initiative aims to encourage students who walk or cycle to college to be visible and to arrive safely.





### Achievement 3/2018

In relation to the strategic objective addressing crime prevention and personal safety, a 'Home Safety Presentation' was held on 9th April 2018, in conjunction with the Joint Policing Committee, Gort Neighbourhood Watch and An Garda Síochána, in Gort.

There was a large attendance at this informative evening where a member of An Garda Síochána addressed the group and gave advice on personal safety and An Garda Síochána's Crime Prevention Officer also addressed the members of the public present. Reflective material was circulated also to make road users more visible. The initiative was a huge success and it is hoped that it will encourage other towns to undertake this Presentation.



### Achievement 4/2018

During 2018, the Joint Policing Committee received briefings to aid delivery on the strategic objectives as detailed in the JPC Strategic Plan 2015 – 2021.

The **Crime Prevention/Personal Safety** sub-committee advised the Committee that new data protection regulations, which came into effect on 25th May 2018, would have implications for CCTV and a Data Awareness training workshop was held for the County Galway Joint Policing Committee.

Chief Supt. Patrick Clavin, Chief Bureau Officer, Criminal Assets Bureau (CAB) presented a briefing to the Members on the Criminal Assets Bureau which was established in 1996 with its aim is to identify the criminally acquired assets of persons and to take the appropriate action to seize these assets. He confirmed that CAB was a separate statutory body that worked alongside An Garda Siochána, Dept. of Revenue, Dept. of Social Protection and Dept. of Justice.



### Achievement 5/2018

The three sub-committees of the JPC (*Illegal Dumping & Litter Awareness Sub-Committee, Education & Awareness – School Programme Sub-Committee and Crime Prevention/Personal Safety Sub-Committee*), continued in 2018 to deliver on the strategic objectives of the Strategic Plan 2015 – 2021.

The key actions and projects initiated and undertaken by each of the three Committees in 2018 are outlined in the table above entitled **Item 1 Summary of Progress for 2018**.

### ITEM 3: PUBLIC MEETING HOSTED BY THE JPC DURING THE YEAR.

The 2018 County Galway JPC public meeting was held on 5<sup>th</sup> November 2018 in O'Sullivans Hotel, Gort. Members of the public were invited to this meeting with up to 60 persons attending on the night.

Questions to be considered by the Joint Policing Committee were also invited from the public prior to the meeting on general policing matters affecting the policing of the County of Galway.

Some of the following topics were also raised and discussed at the Meeting:

- Crime in the area and the benefits of text-alert, community alert and neighbourhood watch schemes to assist in crime detection/prevention.
- Traffic speed on towns streets and increased Garda presence on M18 required.
- Anti-social behaviour and public drinking on the streets.
- Illegal dumping and the necessity for the installation of CCTV cameras at strategic locations to prevent illegal dumping.
- Unauthorised encampments and roaming horses.
- The importance of wearing hi-vis jackets and the promotion of same to all, not just school going children.
- Drugs for sale or supply in Schools.

Cllr. Peter Roche, Chairperson of the JPC, thanked all who attended the meeting and who raised concerns/issues and acknowledged that the JPC Public meetings provide an excellent opportunity for the public to engage with the local authority and the Gardaí in matters relating to the general policing of the county.
