

## Introduction

The following is a report on the work of the County Kildare Joint Policing Committee for 2018:-

County Kildare Joint Policing Committee (JPC) aims to develop greater consultation, co-operation and synergy on policing and crime issues between An Garda Síochána, Local Authorities and elected local representatives and also facilitate the participation of the community/voluntary sectors in this regard.

The function of the JPC is set out in section 36(2) of the Garda Síochána Act 2005, which states: “The joint policing committee’s function is to serve as a forum for consultations, discussions and recommendations on matters affecting the policing of the local authority’s administrative area”.

### Policing Report

Chief Superintendent Brian Sutton presented an overview of the key policing activities for the Kildare Divisions at each of the Kildare JPC Meetings, including quarterly crime analysis, crime prevention and community policing measures, road traffic statistics and details of Garda resources.

The Chief Superintendent and his colleagues responded to questions on the policing report from members of the committee at each meeting as required. The issue of Garda resources in County Kildare was a recurring theme throughout the year and the committee was pleased to note that there has been some improvement in 2018 in this regard.

### Presentations

In addition to the Policing Reports, the JPC received several presentations and updates at each of its meetings. Some of the highlights are as follows:

**March-** Understanding how the Criminal Assets Bureau links with local Gardaí through the use of trained asset profilers.

**June-** An Garda Síochána role within the Kildare Age Friendly County Strategy 2016-2018.

**September-** Update on community-based CCTV schemes.

**December:** Guest speaker Mr. John Lonergan, former Governor of Mountjoy Prison (pictured).





## Local information meetings between An Garda Síochána and Municipal Districts councillors

An Garda Síochána continued to meet with members of each of the five Municipal District on a quarterly basis throughout 2018. A common theme emerging from these meetings is that engagement at local level in this manner can and does eliminate problems such as anti-social behaviour and damage to public property. The members of each Municipal District noted the importance of these meetings being held “in committee”. The members believe that the formats of these meetings are beneficial as they are an informal exchange of information at a local level.

The plan was adopted in June 2016. The plan's primary goal is to support safer communities by focusing on nine strategic objectives to support enhanced policing and crime prevention.


These objectives are:

1. Garda resources.
2. Crime prevention – assignment of Gardaí to specialist posts such as Community Gardaí, drugs specialists etc.
3. Anti-social behaviour and street crime.
4. Misuse of drugs, alcohol and related crime.
5. Wildlife protection and cruelty to animals.
6. To increase public safety of newly designed roads and developments across Kildare – An Garda Síochána and Kildare County Council working in partnership.
7. To liaise with older people in the county through the Older Person's Council.
8. To strengthen the relationship between An Garda Síochána and the local community.
9. To support the local implementation of the National Strategy on Domestic, Sexual and Gender-based Violence.

County Kildare Joint Policing Committee - Annual Public Meeting

County Kildare Joint Policing Committee is a forum for community consultation on policing matters.

Its annual public meeting took place in Coláiste Lorcáin in Castledermot on Monday night and was attended by about 80 people.

The agenda included a policing report by Chief Superintendent Brian Sutton, a motivational speech by former prison governor John Lonergan and a public question and answer session on issues like Garda numbers, N7 traffic calming and community CCTV.

Chief Superintendent Brian Sutton told the audience that there were 6,556 victims of crime in County Kildare from January to October 2018. He emphasised proactive policing as an effective way to deal with local issues, citing the new interagency response to anti-social behaviour in the Naas Municipal District as a good model.

John Lonergan gave a rousing speech on social issues, based on a 42-year career in the prison service. 'I never met a happy drug addict', he said. 'Drugs bring nothing but misery in the long term. Get young people involved in activities. Teach them how to make decisions and solve problems. All of those things will protect them from future moments of madness'.

He rallied the community representatives present by saying, 'We need to move from blame to personal responsibility. Take ownership of issues in your own community and never apologise for demanding the resources you need to solve them'.

Thanks to everyone who made last night's event such a productive and respectful exchange.

Thanks also to Coláiste Lorcáin for providing the venue. Your school posters on positive thinking really enhanced our community event!
