2. Introduction

The South Dublin County Joint Policing Committee was established on the 26th October 2007. The Committee continues to provide a forum for representatives from An Garda Síochána, South Dublin County Council, Oireachtas members and Community representatives, to make an important contribution to addressing issues relating to crime locally, to get together in a regular and structured way, to consult with each other and to discuss and make recommendations on matters affecting the policing of South Dublin County.

The Joint Policing Committee is a partnership, co-operative in nature and operating with the minimum of formality to identify, raise awareness of and find solutions to issues impacting on, or causing concerns for the local community.


South Dublin Joint Policing Committee continues to be a partnership between An Garda Síochána, South Dublin County Council and the residents of South Dublin County. Members of the Joint Policing Committee work together to help prevent crime and solve neighborhood problems by:

- Encouraging active citizen involvement in policing efforts.
- Focusing on issues of ongoing public concern.
- Providing continuity of service to the community
- Ensuring active involvement by the relevant staff in problem-solving
- Initiate creative responses to neighborhood problems.
- Developing the capacity of residents and affording them the opportunity to speak and act effectively on their own behalf
- Strengthening and building groups and organizations so residents can advocate for their own interests.
- The work of the LPF Management Committees and LPF Public Meetings convened by the four Local Policing Fora and their role and reporting relationship to the Joint Policing Committee increases community involvement and trust in the work of the committee.

3. Structure



4. Strategic Plan

At the Joint Policing Committee meeting held on the 24th November 2017 the Strategic Plan for 2016-2022 was agreed. The Plan links to other plans and strategies including An Garda Síochána Annual Policing Plan and South Dublin County Local Economic & Community Plan (LECP) 2016-2021.

Other Plans considered were:

- A Safer Community: South Dublin County Council Road Safety Plan 2016-2020 (published August 2016)
- Clondalkin Drug and Alcohol Task Force Strategic Plan 2018 2025 Reclaiming Community Development as an Effective Response to Drug Harms, Policy Harms, Poverty and Inequality was agreed in 2018.
- Tallaght Drug and Alcohol Task Force Strategic Plan 2017 2020 was designed and developed as an interagency collaboration, and our vision is to continue this interagency collaboration in the implementation of this strategy. Three strategic themes shaped the plan:
 - Improved service user and community outcomes
 - Effective partnership
 - Increased capacity

A "Framework Policy for Local and Community Development in Ireland was approved by Government in December 2015 and is an overarching high-level vision for the State's engagement with the local and community development sectors. Joint Policing Committees are identified within the following objectives as having a role:

- Objective 2: Working with partners:
 - \circ $\;$ pursue an integrated "whole government" approach at central and local levels
- Objective 3: Planning for Local and Community Development:
 - Support an integrated, coherent approach through the County Local Economic and Community Plan that is adaptable to changing needs and which clearly identify the outcomes they aim to achieve
 - Ensure priorities, as set out in the relevant Local Economic and Community Plan for expenditure at local level across all community and local development programmes are based on appropriate needs analysis and matched to available resources
- Objective 4: Delivery
 - Through the County Local Economic and Community Plan. Deliver an integrated approach to economic development and community development at local level within the local authority area
 - Through the County Local Economic and Community Plan, manage the delivery of interventions that provide positive action programmes targeting those groups that are most marginalised, and support them to become involved in issues and concerns affecting themselves and their communities

A Memorandum of Understanding between the Joint Policing Committee and the Local Community Development Committee was drafted in 2017 and agreed at the first Joint Policing Committee meeting in 2018.


5 Demographics

Population (2016 Census)

The 2016 Census statistics for population show that the population of the state has risen from 4,588,252 in 2011 to 4,757,976 in 2016 an increase of 169,724 and a 3.7% increase. The population of South Dublin County has risen from 265,205 in 2011 to 278,749 in 2016 an increase of 13,544 and a 5.1% increase



In South Dublin County, the Gardaí and the Local Authority have a good working relationship. Contact is made both at Senior Level, through The Joint Policing Committee and other inter-agency committees and also at operational level with the Community and Housing Departments and the Community and Juvenile Liaison Sections of the Gardaí.

Drugs

Following repeated reports from members of the Joint Policing Committee and recommendations from the South Dublin County Community Platform and the Public Participation Network, the Joint Policing Committee set up a Drug Intimidation Subcommittee to consider this topic. Both the Gardaí and Local Authority officials are involved, together with members of the Drug & Alcohol Task Forces. Two Seminars on the issue were held one in 2011 (and the second in 2016. At this seminar, several suggestions were made including:

- The need for "mini CABs" to address the wealth generated by drug suppliers
- That the impact of poverty and unemployment within disadvantaged and Traveller communities is linked to the problem of drug misuse and then drug related intimidation
- That the impact of intimidation on people's mental health be recognised and that GPs have a role to play here
- That there is a need to address the "normalisation" of drugs where recreational drug use has a huge impact on communities
- That mothers/women are often the victims of intimidation and that drug related intimidation has similarities to the impact of domestic violence

Following the seminar in May 2016 at the Joint Policing Committee meeting held on the 25th November 2016 it was agreed to form a Drug Subcommittee which comprised the following members and met twice in 2020.

Integration Strategy

The new South Dublin County Council Integration Strategy 2019-2023 was launched in 2019. The Strategic Plan identifies the following actions which are relevant to the Joint Policing Committee, policing and community safety and the Joint Policing Committee supports the implementation of these actions contained in the strategy.

- Action: Support the setting up of resident's associations in new estates and Strategic Development Zones, paying particular care to make sure opportunities for representation from those different ethnic backgrounds exist.
 Partners: Neighbourhood Watch Committees
- Action: Develop improved representation and participation from minority ethnic communities in Local policing Forums to ensure comprehensive representations of and communication with all community groups and issues of concern as they arise. Joint Policing Committee work plan to support strategy actions

Partners: Garda Siochana, Local D&ATF, SDCC and Joint Policing Committee

 Action: Initiatives will be undertaken aimed at increasing the number of migrant representatives in local authority fora, like Public Participation Networks (PPNs) and their representative forums
 Partners: PPN, South Dublin Migrant Integration Forum, Joint Policing Committee, and sports

Partners: PPN, South Dublin Migrant Integration Forum, Joint Policing Committee, and sports Partnership

Safety in Parks

The Joint Policing Committee set up a Parks Working Group in November 2009 to look at safety in public parks and continues to address park issues as they arise. A multi-agency working group comprising officers of SDCC from Housing and parks along with An Garda Siochana and local community representatives have been meeting regularly to address community safety issues around the park. Recently in 2020 St Cuthbert's Park has had a multi-agency and cross departmental response to issues of ASB and vandalism in the park area.

CCTV

The Joint Policing Committee considers that CCTV is an important tool in combating crime and antisocial behaviour. The Community CCTV schemes in Tallaght and Clondalkin are now monitored in Tallaght and Ronanstown Garda Stations. Both the County Council and the Gardaí are working closely together to ensure that the CCTV schemes in this County are successful in terms of safety, prevention and intervention.

CCTV schemes within the County were audited in 2019 by the Data Protection Office. A report recommending that the JPC seek authorisation under Section 38 of the Garda Síochána Act, 2005 to regularise CCTV cameras where such approval had not previously been sought in specific historic cases was considered on the 18th September 2020, The JPC agreed to approve two existing cameras in Tallaght and Clondalkin. In addition, two cameras in the Balgaddy area which had been managed by the Housing Department of SDCC were added to the scheme.

Halloween 2020

An interagency approach which included the Council, Gardaí, Fire Brigade and Dublin Bus continued to promote a Safe Halloween, but Covid 19 had an impact on community-based activities held around Halloween aimed at making events safer and less bonfires had to be reconsidered this year. Covid 19 did have an impact with less large fires and less antisocial behaviour in the County.


Late Night Leagues

The late-night leagues had continued to be successful throughout the County. The initiative is based around the concept of using football as a tool for social inclusion and learning, divert youths from crime and anti-social behaviour and encouraging at risk young people to participate in meaningful activities, thus reducing anti-social behaviour. Late night Leagues in 2020 had started with one week of activity before the first lockdown due to Covid-19 hit in March.

The FAI online courses did not target youth at risk groups. Some youths engaged with the services of Crosscare or Foróige which the FAI would normally work with – but due to Covid – all these group activities were also restricted.

7 Local Policing Fora and Public Meetings

South Dublin County Joint Policing Committee set up three Local Policing Fora which are in Tallaght, Clondalkin and North Clondalkin. In addition, South Dublin County covers part of the D12 Local Policing Forum. Public meetings are organised by the Local Policing Fora and supported by the Joint Policing Committee. Each Local Policing Fora is made up of representatives of the Local Authority, Garda Síochána, Elected Representatives, Local Drugs Task Force and local residents. The relevant Superintendents/Chief Superintendents with Inspectors and Community Garda attend these meetings together with senior managers from the Housing and Community Department of South Dublin County Council. This commitment by the most senior Gardaí and Local Authority officials has been recognised by the Local Policing Fora members and the local community. This also allows the most senior staff in both organisations to hear the difficulties, fears and concerns first-hand from residents. The Local Policing Fora also allow for input and discussion with other local safety initiatives such as the Dublin Bus/LUAS Fora.



LPF Management Committees struggled to meet in 2020 due to Covid-19 with Tallaght holding no meetings and Clondalkin just the one. D12 and North Clondalkin LPFs were more successful meeting together before the pandemic and then for a short period when they could socially distance meet. Meetings otherwise took place through Zoom.

Only one public meeting was held in 2020. Reports from the public and management meetings have been presented to all meetings of the Joint Policing Committee in 2020. The following issues have been raised in public meetings in 2020:


